
MANY CANADIANS SEE BROKEN HEALTHCARE SYSTEM

MOST ASSUME MISALLOCATION OF PUBLIC RESOURCES

LABOUR BURNOUT SEEN AS BIG DRIVER OF ACCESS BARRIERS





METHODOLOGY

This survey was conducted with 2,260 Canadians aged 18 and over, from November 24 to December 10, 2022. A random sample of panelists were invited to complete the survey from a set of partner panels based on the Lucid exchange platform. These partners are typically double opt-in survey panels, blended to manage out potential skews in the data from a single source.

The margin of error for a comparable probability-based random sample of the same size is +/- 2.06%, 19 times out of 20.

The data were weighted according to census data to ensure that the sample matched Canada's population according to age, gender, and region. Totals may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

KEY FINDINGS

- 1. Over half of Canadians want their provincial government to prioritize funding the public healthcare system today, the only highly ranked priority that isn't about cost of living.
- 2. The vast majority of Canadians agree public healthcare in Canada should be universal; based on people's needs rather than their ability to pay. There is a significant generational cleavage on this, with Canadians over 60 nearly twice as likely to strongly hold this belief as Canadians under 30.
- 3. The most common unprompted justification for why the public believes their healthcare system isn't working well is a lack of employees/staff.
- 4. Canadians who believe the public healthcare system is working poorly acknowledge multiple factors at play driving poor performance, including worker shortages, government mismanagement, and underinvestment.
- 5. They believe staff shortages are being driven by health professionals leaving their jobs due to burn out from long hours, and the emotional and physical strains of the job.

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KEY FINDINGS: ASSESSING THE SYSTEM

- 6. The most common unprompted justification for why the public believes their healthcare system isn't working well is a lack of employees/staff.
- 7. Canadians who believe the public healthcare system is working poorly acknowledge multiple factors at play driving poor performance, including worker shortages, government mismanagement, and underinvestment.
- 8. They believe staff shortages are being driven by health professionals leaving their jobs due to burn out from long hours, and the emotional and physical strains of the job.
- 9. Canadians do not believe the availability of funding dollars is the driver of the current quality of healthcare in their province. More assume governments choose other priorities over healthcare spending, causing mediocrity.




KEY FINDINGS: ASSESSING THE SYSTEM

- 10. More Canadians assume the funding being allocated to healthcare is falling behind the rising costs of the system, than assume funding is keeping up or surpassing the costs of healthcare.
- 11. When asked who is most responsible for the current state of healthcare, most Canadians blame government. While marginally more blame their provincial government than the federal government, the majority blame both equally.
- 12. Most Canadians have a positive view of healthcare workers and their impact on the system. They hold them in higher esteem than employers, unions, or either level of government.
- 13. That said, healthcare unions are acknowledged by most Canadians to be playing an important role in advocating for quality care in Canada, and in preventing the collapse of the public system. Few demonize unions the way they blame the provinces or federal government for the state of the system. While unions are thought to prioritize workers over patients or Canadians in general, this is not incompatible with what the public sees as their positive outcomes.












FACTORS THAT DRIVE STAFF SHORTAGES

FUNDING GAPS – CAPACITY VS. PRIORITIES






STATE OF HEALTHCARE FUNDING: SUFFICIENCY






FUNDING VS. RISING COSTS OF HEALTHCARE









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

IMPACT ON HEALTHCARE SYSTEM






